Since then (the impatient subscriber will not be surprised to read that this is being written in May, 1974) some people have discovered that there are those who might use these papers to express vigorous agreement in theory in order to cover up a most deplorable nonpractice. In short there is many a slip between the cup and the lip. But the cup is here still. Who knows, some might dare risk a non-slip.
