ON the feast of St. Ignatius Loyola, 31 July 1956, Father Leo A. Cullum S.J. assumed office as Rector of the Ateneo de Manila. At the same time he relinquished his position as Editor of PHILIPPINE STUDIES.

Father Cullum's abilities as writer and as editor are of an unusual order, as may be judged from the published results which found a fitting climax in the publication of Volume 4 Number 2—the Ignatian issue. Father Cullum's new office puts him in charge of a 97-year-old institution which has given to the Philippines some of its greatest heroes and some of its best-known men. It puts him in charge of two campuses and a student body of over four thousand. His is the policy-making responsibility for a Graduate School, a School of Law, a College of Arts and Sciences, a High School, a Grade School, and the many and varied activities, both intramural and extramural, for which the Ateneo has become famous in the cultural, social and religious life of this country. Needless to say we wish him every success, and we wish to express the hope that, despite the onerous duties of his office, he may find the time to write an occasional article for the Quarterly which he founded.
